As I write this, my Ship is making

plans for our Spring boat clean-up and restoration project, as well as getting ready for three different training events. Whoever told me that Winter was the quiet time of the year for Sea Scouting had to have been out of their minds. (Come to think of it, I can't think of what IS the "quiet" time of the year for Sea Scouting.)

Elsewhere in this issue, you will receive reports on several exciting projects the Northeast Region Sea Exploring Committee is working on. Among them are the Basic Training Weekend, Seabadge training, SEAL training, several sales-related efforts. the Regional Boatswain, Task Force wardrooms, and of course, "The Telegraph." We know that there's a lot more that needs to be done, but we're making great progress in building the resources to make Northeast Region Sea Exploring the best in the nation.

I wanted to mention a few other items that fall either partially or completely outside the scope of the Northeast Region Sea Exploring Committee. Firstly, Sea Exploring will be exhibiting at the National Scout Jamboree this summer. At the time I am writing this (3 January), there are still eight openings for Sea Scouts to participate on exhibit

staff. The Scout must be 16 by the time of the Jamboree and we are encouraging her/him to have completed their Seaman Ordinary rank by then as well. The exhibit staff will include Sea Scouts and Sea Scouters from at least 15 states with all four regions represented. The cost for Sea Scouts is \$222.50, well below what the Boy Scouts will be paying. Additionally, we are planning several activities for Sea Scouts to participate in that should be lots of fun. If you're interested, give me a call (410-740-7204, or bjoh@loc.gov) and I'll fill you in on the details.

Several Northeast Region leaders have been involved in developing a new Sea Explorer (youth) leadership training course called "S.E.A.L." (No, that's not commando training ... it's "Sea Explorer Advanced Leadership" training.) Skipper Jerry Crabtree will be holding the first Northeast Region SEAL course this summer on the Chesapeake Bay. This will be particularly exciting and worthwhile. We hope to see Sea Scouts from throughout the Region

We are also well on the way to finishing the text of a new, Third Edition of the "*Handbook for Skippers*." The last edition dates from 1971 and has long been out of print. Leaders from Connecticut, Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, Maryland, Florida, Alabama,

Texas, Wisconsin, California, and Washington State have contributed to the effort. There still is a lot to do to make the new edition available, but we expect to see it available some time in 1998.

The new Quartermaster medals are now available. For the first time in MANY years, the Quartermaster medals are being made of sterling silver from high quality molds. The National Sea Exploring Committee is providing all new Quartermaster recipients with a

beautiful presentation kit that includes the medal, a lapel pin, and a quartermaster charm. Ships may wish to use the last two as gifts to Quartermaster dads and moms. Individuals who already hold the Quartermaster and would like to purchase replacements must submit their request on a special form available from Bill Rogers, the National Sea Exploring Director, or from Commodore Johnson. (Sorry, replacement medals are not free.)

Finally, for those of you who are hooked to the Internet, there has been quite a bit of work on the Sea Exploring presence there. The BSA - USOC & U.S. Sailing Association Join Forces to Offer Sailing Instructors Course

The BSA has received a grant from the U.S. Olympic Committee to train Sea Exploring leaders in sailing skills using the expertise of the U.S. Sailing Association. The objective is to develop a pool of instructors/ trainers who can provide additional skills training to both adult and youth member in the Sea Exploring program. This additional training should help the BSA attract more youth to the exciting adventures in Sea Exploring. The Northeast Region will soon be asking local councils to nominate individuals who would be interested in serving as an instructor/trainer in their council. Those individuals would then offer skills training in their area for interested youth and adults.

Members of the Northeast Region Sea Exploring Committee will select the final participants from the list of nominated individuals. Through the grant from the USOC, the BSA will pick up the cost of the U.S. Sailing Association course as well as room and board for the individuals selected.

Course dates are scattered throughout the spring and summer. Participants may select a course and location best suited to them.







The Boy Scouts of America has a new Junior. Leader Training Course and award. It is called Sea Explorer Advanced leadership Training (SEAL). This is a one week, hard core leadership course that is conducted at sea. If you successfully complete the course you will be awarded the SEAL Training award, which is a silver pin with twin dolphins, to be worn on your uniform.

This course is a leadership course, not a seamanship course. The course covers such



topics as preparing, goal setting, organizing, supervising, commanding, communicating, training, motivating and other topics that will assist you in functioning as a leader in your Ship and in life.

To attend a SEAL class you must be a registered Sea Explorer. You must be Ordinary Rank by 1 July, 1997 and you must study and have a working knowledge of Chapter Five of the Sea Explorer Manual.

The SEAL Class that will be held on the Chesapeake Bay will run from **July 12 to July 19** out of Galesville, Maryland. You must furnish your own transportation to Galesville, Maryland.
