Regional Bridge of Honor and Sea Scout Ball Held 2-3 April 2005 in Bridgeport, New Jersey

The Northeast Region Bridge of Honor and Sea Scout Ball held on 2-3 April 2005 at the Holiday Inn Executive Conference Center in Bridgeport, NJ was a sell-out success. 250 Sea Scouts and Scouters from 25 ships in 8 states of the Northeast Region received recognition of their achievements during the past year in the formal dinner and Bridge of Honor portion of the evening, and a chance to socialize with their friends during the Sea Scout Ball which followed.

Ship 1942, SSS DRAGON LADY, from Alexandria, VA performed the landship ceremony. Music was provided by "Five by Five", a New York brass quintet, who performed the National Anthem, Taps, and Scouts of the Sea, a song written by Commander Thomas J. Keane which appears in the Sea Scout Manual. Dance music during the Sea Scout Ball was provided by DJ "Rock Your Body".

The keynote dinner speaker was Command Master Chief Bennie O. Pearce, United States Navy (Surface/Aviation Warfare Specialist/Fleet Marine Force). Special Guest National Boatswain James Houghton was on hand to talk about his tenure as National Boatswain.

The Saturday afternoon pre-dinner Youth Program was led by outgoing Regional Boatswain Grant Cutler and outgoing Regional Boatswain's Mate Amanda Saulsgiver. The Adult Discussion Group featured Rear Commander Patricia Governale, Senior Navigator, and Past Commander Donald Baker, Senior Navigator, US Power Squadron, District 4, which covers most of NJ, Manhattan

and the Bronx, NY. They shared portions of their "Boat Smart" and "Chart Smart" public boating safety courses and provided handouts of the class schedules for all the USPS squadrons in the NE Region area.

On Sunday, there was a devotional service led by Reverend Gene Foley followed by a Skippers Informational Meeting facilitated by Commodore Bruce Johnson. There was also a Boatswains Informational Meeting coordinated by the new Regional Boatswain Amanda Saulsgiver and new Regional Boatswain's Mate Angela LeChevalier.

Sea Scouts to Augment Venture Quest 2005, 6-8 May 2005



The Northeast Region Venture Quest 2005 Weekend will be held at the York-Adams Area Council's Camp Tuckahoe near Dillsburg, PA 6-8 May 2005. The weekend is designed for all adults and youth in the Venturing or Sea Scouting programs. Sessions will revolve around separate tracks for youth, adult volunteers, and Scouting professionals.

The Advisor Track includes classes on Powder Horn/Kodiak training, one year wonders, the big adventure, the role of the advisor, troop leadership, a hat full of fun and games, fund raising, Venturing open forum, and planning a long cruise.

The youth track will have sessions on successful recruiting for your crew, the path to advancement (a look into Bronze, Gold, Silver, Ranger and Quest), the Venturing Officers Association, a good turn for America (community service and the venturing crew), topics for joint session with advisors, youth officers, district/council, and professionals, a Sea Scout sailing clinic, information about the SEAL program, and regatta skills.

The track for District and Council-level volunteers and for Scouting Professionals includes sessions on avoiding crews becoming one year wonders, increasing the opportunity to join Venturing, district and council support for venturing crews, quality crews, the 80/20 session, a panel of advisors for professionals and district/council volunteers, and how to organize Sea Scout ships.

In addition there will be group sessions for open discussions, opening and closing events, sessions with guest speakers, mealtime presentations and some free time. An exchange fair of Venturing ideas will be set up in the dining hall.

This is the first Quest involving Sea Scout activities. Sea Scouts hope to show land Venturers what takes place on the other 70% of the earth's surface. Make your reservation as soon as possible. Successful East-Coast Safety-at-Sea Weekend Will Be Repeated 16-18 September 2005

Over one hundred high-school age Sea Scouts and over fifty Sea Scout leaders from fourteen ships in Maryland, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Delaware, and New Jersey descended on U.S. Coast Guard Yard Curtis Bay at Baltimore, MD 10-12 September 2004 for the first Joint East Coast U.S. Coast Guard / Sea Scout Safety at Sea Weekend.

Modeled on the very successful West Coast version of the event held at U.S. Coast Guard Station Yuerba Buena in San Francisco Bay, this was the first attempt to replicate the event on a large scale in the East. The event was so successful that the 2nd Safety-at-Sea Weekend will be held at the same location 16-18 September 2005.

The Sea Scouts arrived Friday night and were welcomed by USCG Liaisons LT Andrew Ely and ENS Gerald Hewes. The crews were briefed by two Coast Guard Recruiters. The group then screened the movie *Perfect Storm*.

On Saturday, the youth divided into Companies ALFA through FOXTROX to participate in stations including a demonstration of the P-5 pump, damage control training, a law enforcement seminar and video, fire hose training, hypothermia simulation, and launching pyrotechnics. A highlight of the morning was a live sea-to-air rescue demonstration performed by a HH-60J Jayhawk helicopter from the USCG Air Station at Elizabeth City, NC. For the adults, Zack Smith and Justin Blakely from the Fiorentino Para-Anchor Company demonstrated how to rig and deploy sea anchors and drogues onboard Sea Scout Training Vessel *der PeLiKan*, a 46' Morgan auxiliary ketch.

Saturday evening provided opportunities for volleyball and basketball at the Rec Center and a demonstration of Small Boat Safety Equipment. Later, youth DJ's played tunes for the evening dance in the gym.

Sunday's activities included reflection on the topic of A Scout is Reverent, hoisting the colors, touring a Maryland state police H-65 helicopter, fire extinguisher training, and a tour of the U.S. Coast Guard buoy tender JAMES RANKIN.

SASW-2004 ended promptly at noon on Sunday. The Sea Scouts and Leaders learned about the various missions of the United States Coast Guard, acquired new skills, met new friends, and had a lot of fun in the process. The USCG showed the public just what "Semper Paratus" really means.

This year's Seabadge NE-XV Conference takes advantage of the three-day Columbus Day weekend to provide additional time to cover the standard syllabus topics, tour the Navy's only east-coast hospital ship, and visit the annual U.S. Sailboat Show in nearby Annapolis, MD.

Seabadge NE-XIV Course at USCG Air Station Cape Cod 15-17 October 2004 a Big Success

There were 29 participants in addition to the staff. Meals were enjoyed in the Air Station Wardroom Mess. In addition to the standard conference topics, two SEAL graduates from SSS NOBSKA detailed their experiences and encouraged Sea Scouters to urge more qualified youth to apply for the SEAL program. Other value-added activities included a briefing and demonstration by the Air Station search and rescue swimmer.

Ship 25 Competes in 2004 Bermuda Ocean Race and Subsequent Storm

Members of Ship 25 from York, PA went on a 35-day, 2,500 nautical mile long cruise last summer. They participated in the bi-annual Annapolis to Bermuda race, and then returned via Cape Hatteras and the intra-coastal waterway with stops including New Bern, NC, the Pamlico Sea Base, and Norfolk, VA. They placed 4th out of 8 in class on leg one of the race (Annapolis to the Virginia Capes). On leg two, the Bermuda high deprived them of wind nearing Bermuda, so they had to motor the last few miles and earn a DNF for the

race as a whole. Not discouraged, the crew spent the following week visiting the island's beautiful beaches and historic sights including the Royal Naval Dockyard.

On the return Bermuda to Hatteras leg, the crew encountered the Coast Guard Training Barque EAGLE under sail. They also encountered gale-force winds and seas that were sufficient to cause another crew to abandon their boat, Perfect Day, and seek rescue by the U.S. Coast Guard. A highlight of the stop in Norfolk was a tour of the battleship USS WISCONSIN (BB-64).

William I. Koch International Sea Scout Cup Competition in 2006
